THE SMALL GRANTS PROGRAMME OF THE IKP provides funding to organizations or individuals linked to organizations actively working on the protection and perpetuation of indigenous knowledge, innovations and practices for the conservation and sustainable and equitable use of biological diversity.

The Small Grants Programme for Research supports indigenous peoples' organizations in research activities that:

- Develop the capacity of indigenous peoples' organizations to identify priority research topics on indigenous knowledge and biodiversity and to undertake and direct research;
- 2. Strengthen the capacity of indigenous peoples' organizations to offer high quality training to indigenous people;
- 3. Convey outcomes of programme research and training facilities effectively to key audiences;
- 4. Ensure efficient management of research, training and dissemination activities.

The programme will provide up to US\$12,000 per project to support research activities that produce specific research results and that build individual or organizational capacity in research techniques.

INDIGENOUS PEOPLES' ORGANIZATIONS and individuals affiliated with such organizations are invited to submit proposals for small grants funding. Current riority areas for funding are agricultural biodiversity, coastal and marine biodiversity and forest biodiversity with a particular emphasis on research outputs and community initiatives that will contribute to strategies for the Convention of Biological Diversity and other relevant international fora such as the Food and Agriculture Organization and the Commission on Sustainable Development.

Priority will be given to regions where biodiversity is highly threatened and indigenous knowledge endangered.

All applications to the Small Grants Programme of the IKP are reviewed by the Selection Committee composed of five individuals from the IKP Advisory Group and Steering Committee. The Selection Committee may give technical advice regarding the design of particular projects. The Selection Committee may ask for revisions prior to accepting a proposal. The Committee will also be responsible for reviewing and evaluating final project reports.

Review and selection of proposals will be based on whether the project:

- 1. addresses one or more of the programme priority areas
- 2. includes research activities that contribute to strategies for the implementation of the Convention on Biological Diversity and other relevant international fora
- 3. includes development activities that will provide benefits to the community beyond the scope of this project
- 4. has feasible objectives considering the time line and budget allocation

Your small grants application should include:

- proposal addressing the 13 elements described in the guidelines;
- formal letter of request from organization or individual;
- organization's corporate papers;
- individual's or organization's address, telephone number and name of contact person.
