Dear Paul Robeson Fund Applicant,

During the weekend of March 17-19th, 1995, The Paul Robeson Fund for Independent Media Funding Board met and allocated \$150,000 in grants to independent social issue film, video and radio production. Paul Robeson Fund Board members represent a diverse group of social issue media experts, including independent and NPR radio producers, film and video distributors, activists and educators from all over the United States.

I am sorry to inform you that your project was not awarded a grant this cycle. We received 307 completed proposals for funding and awarded 50 grants (36 for film and video and 14 for radio). Obviously, with the amount of money available for grants, even with a number of small grants, less than 20% of projects submitted received funding. A list of this year's grantees is included.

As outlined in the Robeson guidelines, funding is given to projects that address critical and timely social and political issues from progressive perspectives that effectively reach a broad or targeted audience and that combine intellectual clarity with creative use of the medium.

HIGHEST PRIORITY is given to those projects that have a thoroughly developed distribution initiative. As the guidelines state, we seek distribution initiatives that go beyond the traditional channels of television or radio broadcast, film festivals or theatrical release. Top funding priority is given to producers who are clear and specific on how their project will be used at the grassroots level and can demonstrate its effectiveness as a "tool" for progressive social change organizing.

There were many projects the Board would have liked to support. Unfortunately, lack of funds limited the Board's selection to 50 projects.

The most common reasons why a project wasn't funded were:

* project did not fit within the guidelines or application was incomplete;

* project was a repeat of existing media on the same subject with no new perspective;

project not as politically critical as others;

project description was not clearly developed;

* producer did not have a distribution initiative for organizing and/or did not present an initiative that went beyond the usual distribution channels;

* experience of producer did not indicate ability to effectively complete the project;

* producer did not present realistic budget and/or had a weak fundraising strategy;

* sample material (either prior work or current) was not strong in content or style, was not engaging or interesting to watch, was technically inferior, was not relevant to the proposed project (i.e. submitted a 1/2" video documentary and wished to produce a narrative feature film).

You may request, in a telephone discussion only, specific information on why your project did not receive funding (include project title, your name and day phone number). Please call the Funding Exchange and ask for Noeleen or Joy to make an appointment for 15 minutes; then call me at the scheduled time. In most cases the feedback you receive will be one or more of the above. Because of our limited staffing, this is the only way we can respond to your request. Thank you for your understanding.

You may also request, until May 15, 1995, the return of your video or radio tape sample work by sending us a self-addressed padded envelope mailer with the following postage:

The issues come alive when Cree activist Diane Reed, veteran of the struggle against Quebec's Great Whale hydroelectric project, travels to the threatened forests of the Arun Valley in Nepal to discuss strategy with the native peoples there.

OLYMPIC OLIVE, OLYMPIC GOLD

A half-hour documentary about the 50 African American seamen convicted of mutiny and imprisoned for refusing to return to work loading ammunition following the 1944 munitions explosions at the Port Chicago Naval Base near San Francisco. The blasts, which killed 320 men, and the mutiny trial were pivotal historical events that led to desegregation in the Navy following WWII, still resinate today with members of Congress who have asked that the mutiny convictions be set aside and with Navy officials who have refused.

THE RACISM PROJECT
