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WASHINGTON COMMISSION FOR THE HUMANITIES 2002 HUMANITIES RESPONSE GRANT ROUND APPLICATIONS RECEIVED

As of January 11th, 2002, Washington Commission for the Humanities received the following 23 grant proposals requesting a total of \$51,711. Approximately \$20,000 will be awarded this grant round. The Grant Review Committee will make final recommendations for approval to the full Board of Directors on January 25, 2002. Applicants will be notified of the Board decision approximately two weeks after the decision date.

The Literacy Eunde Newspapers In Education, Seattle, Explore Conflict, Inspiring Tolerance, Request: \$2,500.00

Program focusing on the topic of "conflict" in a classroom setting, employing a curriculum to teach real-life skills and strategies to help students deal with the challenges in their lives.

Center for World Indigenous Studies, Olympia, "New War and Fourth World Nations Public Forum"

Request: \$2,499.00

Panel discussion and public forum focusing on indigenous nations, and the need for increased public awareness of the consequences of a "war to defend modernism and against the forces of evil" in the U.S. and abroad.

Seattle Symphony Orchestra, Seattle, Sound Dialogues

Request: \$2,500.00
