MESSAGE: Last week I wrote to Ambassador Lukhin, requesting his support and assistance with the State Department. I will have lunch with Lukhin next Monday in Los Angeles, and told him I would also like to discuss it in person at that time.

Today I spoke with one of my friends at the Russian Embassy, Second secretary Andrei Tsybenko. Andrei was of course with the Yarov delegation, and I'm sure you remember him. He was assigned by Lukhin to follow up on my request of last week. He talked with State, and they requested that he get something more official from the Russian government, to add strength to his request.

Andrei has sent cables off to Abdulatipov and to Yarov. I am certain something will be forthcoming from that. I will also write to both Yarov and Abdulatipov today, asking that they send the strongest possible letter to Ambassador Niles.

Andrei Tsybenko will assist us with the February visit by Abdulatipov, and will continue to be a helpful resource at the embassy.

I promised Andrei that we will send him an updated report right away, and weekly reports on everything that is taking place re the CNS.

By the way, Rudy, we need to talk sometime today regarding my most recent conversation with Russia. They are treating CNS at the highest level, but are insistent that the May meeting be larger than what they think we are intending. They propose combining an international conference on indigenous issues with the chartering session, in order to accomplish the interests of all sides. They have asked us to send them names of everyone, ie: nations, states, NGO's, MLO's, so that official invitations may be sent from the Russian government for all to participate in the May program.

I think we can design this in such a manner as to not screw up the Chartering Session, but not let the Russian government think we gave them a black eye.



Yuri Yarov's visit last fall was on behalf of the Congress of Nations and States, an initiative to develop new means of dispute resolution between states and indigenous populations. Pollowing his visit, we received strong support from Senator Inouye (Senate Subcommittee on Indian Affairs), the Department of Interior (Eddie Brown and Bill Lavell), and a resolution of support from the National Congress of American Indians.

The State Department sent a letter to Yuri Voronin, expressing willingness to participate, but subsequently contacted Russia to indicate concern over the inclusion of ethnic minorities in the definition of indigenous populations. I also believe they feel that the CNS somehow overlaps with the efforts of the United Nations.

Today, Charles Wick sent a letter to Secretary Eagleburger, urging State to give its full support to the CNS, and to make a financial contribution toward carrying out the work of the preparatory committee and the working groups on economic, political, strategic and social issues. We hope this will produce some results, as State's support is crucial to the further implementation of this initiative.

Ramazan Abdulatipov and Vladimir Kuramin have indicated that they will come to the US next month to hold further discussions on this initiative. The United Nations (Julian Berger, Geneva) as well as the six indigenous nations which comprise the preparatory committee, are ready and anxious to move forward with this effort. I would appreciate any support you can give to help get the State Department fully committed before the change of administration.

I will be joining your luncheon with Charles in Los Angeles on January 25, and look forward to briefly discussing the CNS then, if it is convenient,

Today there was a meeting in Moscow of Vice Premier Yarov, Ramazan Abdulatipov and Andrei Trebkov. Abdulatipov is now the #2 in command of the Parliament, below Khazbulatov, and is the counterpart to Yarov vis a vis relations between Yeltsin and the Supreme Soviet. Abdulatipov and Yarov are both activists in the CNS.

Tomorrow there is a parliamentary meeting to discuss State conferences in 1993. The #1 on the agenda is CNS. Since this is the UN Year of the Indignant Peoples, CNS is considered the most important international gathering for 1993.

Abdulatipov will come to the US on Feb 20, with a delegation of 7 people, which incloudes the following:

Ramazan Abdulatipov, Vice Chairman, Supreme Soviet of Russia Vladimir Kuramin, Cabinet Member, Minister, Chmn. Committee on National Policy Minister Kalaev, Chairman Committee on Nationalities.

As before, we are in charge of this delegation, and their only purpose is to advance the cause of the CNS.

Minister Kinkel has been written to again by the Foreign Minister, requesting formal support and financial support for CNS. Ambassador Lukhin has once again been instructed to assist us in any and every way. By the way I will have lunch with Lukhin in Los Angeles on the 25th.

Minister Tishkov is out. He is replaced by Vice Premier Sergel Shakhrai, who concurrently now serves as Minister, and Chairman of the State Committee on National Policy. He is on the organizing committee for CNS, but less active than Yarov and Abdulatipov.

Abdulatipov wants a list of all nations, states and organizations to whom they should send invitations to the May meeting. They will issue official governmental invitations.

Regarding the Preparatory Committee Meeting, they intend to host it at the highest levels within the Russian government, again to demonstrate support for the CNS. Yarov and the others will participate. They did not offer to underwrite the cost of the preparatory session.

An entire packet is being sent to you by mail.

The draft documents are subject to revision and adjustment during the Preparatory Committee meeting. I have enclosed a copy of "The meaning of Nation and State..." for reading in advance of agenda item 4. This paper is intended to be used as a discussion item to aid the Preparatory Committee in its efforts to arrive at some mutually acceptable terms of reference. The unprecedented character of the Congress of Nations and States demands that we begin the process of developing a body of mutually acceptable terms which will assist in the complex communications facing us. Mr. Griggs and Fallon (authors of the analytical document) have given us a head start by giving us an analysis from which we can begin.

We have drafted an unusual agenda which combines formal meetings with a strong dose of informal discussion. I believe we must gain some informal understanding before we make formal decisions critical to the success of the Congress of Nations and States. Please read the Grigges Failon piece and conduct further inquiries on your own before you arrive at the session in Moscow.

As you have noticed, I have enclosed a draft description of the purpose and scope of each of the planned working groups: Economic, Social & Cultural, Political, Strategic and Geographic. I request that your representative bring to the Preparatory Committee meeting recommendations for persons to sit on the Economic, Social & Cultural, Political and Strategic working groups. The technical working group on geography will be recommended to the Preparatory Committee. Representatives of states governments are being asked to recommend persons experienced in the four subject areas of the specialized working groups who will represent the states. Representatives of nations' governments are being invited to offer recommendations for the specialized working groups that come from nations. There already recommended several highly qualified nations representatives to which nation delegations may add

names. Two criteria (other than origin) ought to guide your recommendations: The working group members should have analytical experience with the subject area, and be able to effectively represent either the states or the nations' perspective in working group discussions and negotiations. Six persons (three state and three nation) will be asked to six on the working groups. A seventh person will be justified to serve as a Chairman Rapporteur for the working group. Again, for additional information about the working groups, please read the draft materials which you should receive within the week.

We apologize for notifying you at this late date of the January 21-23 Preparatory Session; we have been working to confirm participation in this effort, as well as financial support, and only this week have been able to finalize the date for this first meeting of the Preparatory Committee. Our efforts have not been in vain: in early October a delegation from the Russian Parliament met with the United States Department of State, the U.S. Congress, the U.S. Bureau of Indian Affairs and with the Senate Select Committee on Indian Affairs. The government of the United States has officially confirmed participation. All invited nations have agreed to participate, and confirmation is pending from the governments of Japan and Germany.

Please inform the Secretariat by telefax whether or not you wish to attend this meeting. If so, please also inform them of your travel schedule so the Secretariat can make any arrangements which will be necessary. Visas are required of every visitor to the Russian Federation: to receive a visa, you must have a passport, an official invitation from your host, and a completed visa application. If you will need the Secretariat's assistance in obtaining an invitation, please telefax all passport data (full name as written on passport, passport number, passport expiration date, country of citizenship) to them.

Again, your participation would add inunensely to the chances for success of this historic undertaking, and we are happy to provide any and all information necessary for a decision to be made.
