The Center for World Indigenous Studies conducts seminars, workshops and briefings at sites throughout the world for professionals, academics, students and activists interested in issues, problems and achievements of indigenous peoples. We conduct site-specific workshops in indigenous government, conflict resolution (indigenous people vs indigenous peoples and indigenous peoples vs state, corporations etc.), traditional medicine, community organization, and cultural revitalization. Usually, workshops are conducted at the invitation of a sponsor, we design the site-specific workshop, organize faculty, scheduling and workshop materials. We have colleagues in Queensland and have received preliminary invitations to conduct a seminar in ~~Fourth World Geopolitics~~ in Western Australia.

Dear Leslie,

In all my applying for positions, I've been accepted to the adjunct faculty of Greenwich University which is a distance learning program based in Hilo, Hawaii. It's unaccredited at this point, but they are ready for accreditation. I had a good conversation with the president this afternoon. One of the ways they work with students and faculty is to accept existing institutes into the program--the institute remains autonomous for the most part, and the school helps to reconcile the institute's format into a degree program.

Caroline Myss and Norman Shealy have brought the Shealy Institute to Greenwich. Students can take courses from the Shealy Inst. and work on a degree or not.

I brought up the idea of Women's Traditional Medicine and the president (Doug) said they've been interested in developing their women's studies programs. They usually have two people working on a program, one is the mentor and the other is the 2nd reader. Myss and Shealy sort of take turns holding either role for their students. They also require students to take their seminars, and since they're famous in the realms of alternative medicine and healing, they have a thousand people taking their programs.

Most of the students work in full time jobs and are in their 40s. The school is developing a reputation in the areas of psychotherapy and business. The school offers Master's degrees and PhDs.

Anyway, I'm wondering if you'd be interested in collaborating on developing a degree program around Traditional Medicine?

There are four types of courses involved with the programs:

- 1) core competency
- 2) field experience & internships
- 3) adva

nced studies, ie, unique specialization areas

4) research preparation

These can be coupled with seminars.

What do you think about this?

Dear Rudy: Yes, I did discuss the possibility with our Director of Political Training, Peter Schoettle, and he responded positively, but he reminded me that this kind of event needs a "sponsor" from the Department of State. That is, we are the "school house" for the Department and we do not do anything without specific approval or demands from the Department. So your next step would be to pursue this with someone in Tim Wirth's shop, or elsewhere, or in Congress who could then send the request to the Department. We will be happy to work with whatever office or persons express the interest, but we are reluctant to push our own agenda--we have been cautioned before regarding the taking of training in directions not to the liking of the Department (not unlike schools teaching things without approval from the central system/school board, etc.).

So good luck and keep me informed of your progress.
