Instructions for Authors

Article Submissions:

To submit an article to IJQM, send an electronic copy of the article, via email attachment or on disk through the mail, to the appropriate regional editor or to ijqm@ualberta.ca. Articles may be in any language, and must be editted for grammar, style, and format prior to submission.

Articles should, preferably, be in MS Word .doc format; however Rich Text [rtf] and WordPerfect files will be accepted. Articles are to be formatted as per the template instructions below. Receipt of the article will be acknowledged via return email, assigning a reference number for future correspondence.

Articles submitted to IJQM will be blind reviewed prior to acceptance or rejection. This process can take up to two or three months. Reviewers are available for most of the major languages of the world, and many of the less common ones.

All authors are responsible for the content of their articles. Research published in IJQM must have been reviewed and approved by the necessary ethics review boards, and have attained all necessary participant consents and permissions. Releases from identifiable persons must be submitted with photographs or video stills. Permissions to use more than 500 words of any copyrighted text, or any portion of poetry, must be obtained from the copyright holder by the author, and notice of such permission must accompany the initial submission to IJQM.

Style:

Please use APA style for your references and citations. Here is a basic guide to APA style.

Article Template:

When submitting an article to IJQM, please download this template -- either MS Word or WordPerfect format -- and use it to format your article. The template sets out the font and paragraph characteristics for the article; the final copy that you submit electronically will be the one that will be posted to the journal site. By formatting your article for publication, you will not only be easing our workload, but you will be minimizing the risk of errors because the webmaster will not be working with the content of your article.

It is important to remember when formatting your article to not let the word processing software format it for you — do it manually. This means do not use the automatic bullet or numbered list features, and also do not use the footnote/endnote features. These do not translate to HTML properly.

Graphics:

Electronic publishing allows for a convenient and inexpensive method of publishing full color graphics, so please feel free to use photographs and illustrations where appropriate. When incorporating an image, such as a photograph, a video screen capture, a table, or an illustration into your article, please insert it into the appropriate position in the body of the article you are submitting for review.

Images and tables embedded into word processor documents (of any format) do not convert properly to html for the web. If your article is

accepted, the IJQM technical editor/webmaster will contact you via email regarding electronic copies of images. Please retain electronic copies of all photos and video captures, in either .jpg or .gif format, to forward to the IJQM on request. These will then be placed in the appropriate place in the published version of the article by the webmaster. For illustrations and tables created in your word processor, please create a copy approximately the size of a standard 8.5" by 11" page, and be prepared to forward this to the IJQM webmaster, who will then scan these items for inclusion in the article.

Multimedia:

At this time, we are not set up to incorporate multimedia (sound or video) into our web pages. If you wish to use these, you must include them as a link to a site on which you store the clips. However, see the disclaimer below regarding links.

Links:

One of the advantages of publishing on the world wide web is the ability to link to supplementary material, enabling the author to provide background information, show more detailed analysis, etc. However, we discourage authors from using this aspect of electronic publishing. There is the problem of permanence on the web -- one of the most frustrating things for users is to encounter broken links because the material has been removed. Please be wary of including links (such as to multimedia material mentioned above) unless you can be sure that these links will be permanent.
