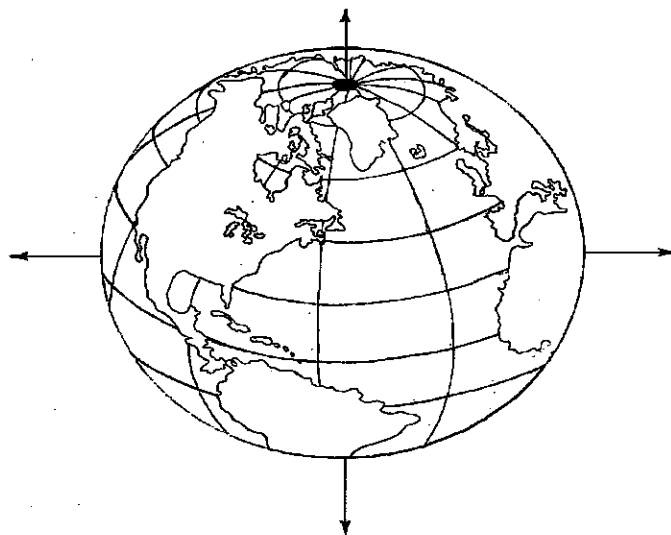

The movement seeks "the complete displacement of Indian peoples with non-Indians" on Indian reservations. Under the guise of "mainstream non-profit research and education organizations" and the deceptively attractive "equal rights for everyone" slogan made more widely popular by former Klansman and Nazi sympathizer David Duke, the Anti-Indian Movement seeks and receives support and money from unsuspecting "reservation non-Indians" and off-reservation non-Indians who "just want to be left alone." With its own agenda, the Anti-Indian Movement employs tactics and slogans calculated to exploit Indian and non-Indian fears of each other. By 1992, the Anti-Indian Movement had contributed to and become a part of the "Wise Use Movement," a property-rights effort that threatens not only Indian nations but the remaining wild and natural environment in the North America.
