# Project director's evaluation

#### Humanities content

Before September 11, 2001 indigenous nations in many places in the world had been engaged in low-intensity conflicts either in defense of their peoples and territories or in movements of self-determination (as many as 80 different conflicts). These conflicts had been described in the press and by foreign policy spokespersons as "internal conflicts" or as regional conflicts. The efforts of the peoples of Kashmir, for example, to exercise self-determination had been thwarted by the interventions of India and Pakistan. Similar conflicts between indigenous nations and states' governments (i.e., Tibet and China, Chechnya and Russia, Papuans and Indonesia, Tamils and Sri Lanka, Palestinians and Israel) had been underway for as many as fifty years. Guests on Fourth World Dialogue coming from the fields of Anthropology, Political Science and the Law point out that these conflicts involving questions of political self-determination, resource access and cultural rights (many of which had been conflicts for a generation or more) were transformed by President George Bush's proclamation of war into conflicts between "terrorists" and states acting in their self-defense on September 11, 2002. As one guest, Dr. Price noted, "it is as if the United States just became aware of the conflict and decided to step in as if it had known and understood all along."

Commentators observed that the U.S. "war on terrorism" is being used as a justification for states' governments to attack and quell legitimate movements of self-determination. America's war on terrorism is drifting into a generalized war on indigenous nations instead of a war focused on defeating the bigotry and violence of Usama bin Laden's militant movement driven by religious zeal, fueled by elicit drugs and precious resources like diamonds, conducted with the tactics of organized crime and systematically organized like a transnational corporation.

#### **Humanities Advisors**

All of the final guests as well as the earlier invited participants who were unable to join the program contributed to shaping the questions, which were originally defined by the Producer. Each invited guest commented on and offered rationale for changing the questions to become more specific and more able to elicit useful insights from the different disciplines. Though the invited guests as well as the finally selected guests came from the fields of journalism, education, political science, international relations, law, anthropology, sociology and cultural geography there was considerable unanimity in their commitment to refining questions to produce the clearest analysis of Fourth World issues. This was particularly important since the subject area is sensitive and complex and prone to misunderstanding.

# Audience Response

While the "in-studio" audience was fairly modest—28 people—there is also a wider audience to which the Fourth World Dialogue is directed. The "in-studio" audience was genuinely appreciative of the clarity and in-depth nature of the opinions and analysis offered by the program host and the guests. Comments to the host about the program included:

"This was a very important public discussion that must be heard all across the country."

"Will you be making tapes available to the public? I want to play this program for my group."

"... a very well done program about a subject that very few people in the country understand."

### Public participation

Public support was only demonstrated by the number of people who attended the public forum and by the number of downloads performed by users of the Fourth World Dialogue page. The local public we had encouraged to arrive generally did participate while some from the Indian community did not. We had been anticipating some turnout among members of local tribes. We believe the time of day, the shortness of the program and conflicts with some local celebrations reduced tribal participation. We have, however, begun to measure the level of participation in the on-line program. That level has been slowly rising over the two months since the program was made available on-line. We estimate about 25,000 people have had access to the program. Our intention to place the program on radio broadcasts have yet to materialize. We are expecting that placement of the program will be done on Native Radio (as a ten minute program) and on public radio in Oakland California and radio in Sydney, Australia. The audiences for these outlets range from 100,000 to 300,000 per market.

#### Evaluation

The technical, organizational and programming aspects of the World War & the Fourth World public forum and its final product, "Fourth World Dialogue" were well planned and effectively executed by the production staff. As with any production where rented equipment, space and other properties are involved there are occasional problems that arise.

In the technical area that is also related to rented space we found that we could not control unexpected room noises coming from an adjacent room resulting in distortions in the sound recordings that covered the first four minutes of the program. The consequence was that these four minutes could not be recovered for rebroadcast.

Another technical problem arose when the hired transcription service did not use the earphone setup we had prepared so that person could hear everything said. The consequence was that the transcriber missed some parts of the audio because she could not hear clearly from the place she had taken up in the audience away from the stage where presenters were seated. It became necessary to put a production assistant on a task of listening to the audiotape to manually make corrections on the draft transcript.

Pre-program development of the program was undertaken during a three-month period before March 11, the date of the public forum. Twelve prospective guests were contacted and agreements made with seven, but in the final analysis three guests were finally secured. Pre-program promotions included a public service announcement in Thurston County, press releases, "emailings" and "postering." The results in terms of public participation were less than expected, but probably about the level one ought to expect for the town of Olympia. Since this program was planned for rebroadcast on the Internet and on radio the actual size of physical audience was not as crucial.

The program ran smoothly and without incident. Post-production efforts were hindered by technological limitations of CWIS computer equipment some of which had to be upgraded. In the final analysis the program was produced and aired as a WEB cast, the transcripts were made available on the WEB. Audio-tape versions of the program and compact disk versions have combined to reach an estimated audience of 25,000 people. This level of participation was anticipated before the production was initiated. Our ability to technically develop and issue radio programs was hampered by limited funds, but the effort to place the audio program at public and commercial outlets continues after the original taping with the expectation that the radio broadcasts combined with the WEB casts will reach perhaps as many as 500,000 people by the end of the year 2002.

The final broadcast and webcast production was edited onto compact disk in its original production format and in a revised format suitable for radio scheduling and web streaming utility. These have been proved quite effective for the different broadcast media.
